THE ORIGINS OF

HERITAGE MONTH AND BERMUDA DAY

Civil unrest in the 1960s and 1970s prompted the Bermuda Government to commission a report examining the social conditions in Bermuda and make recommendations to promote a more unified and peaceful social atmosphere. The Pitt Report of 1978 gave an accurate representation of the social and racially tense atmosphere at the time, and included feedback from many Bermudians that suggested an event should be organised to bring Bermudians together in harmony and to build a sense of civic pride.

It was decided that a parade would provide an opportunity for camaraderie and celebration, similar to the Easter Parade that ran from the 1930s through to the 1960s. During that time, many farmers grew flowers so that they could be in full bloom for the Easter period. It was also suggested in the Pitt Report that the proposed event capture the unifying spirit of the existing May 24 half-marathon. These events both served as inspiration for the Bermuda Day Heritage Parade which replaced Empire Day, the annual public holiday recognising Queen Victoria's birthday. The first Bermuda Day Parade took place in 1979. It was historically celebrated on May 24th or


the weekday nearest May 24th if that date fell on a weekend, in 2018 adjusted to the last Friday in May, and in 2019 onward it will be on the fourth Friday in May. **The Bermuda Day Parade in 2025 is on Friday, May 23, 2025.**

Bermuda quickly realised that one day of celebration was not enough time to recognise the broad spectrum of Bermudian heritage and traditions. Heritage Week was born, celebrated in the last week in May. By the mid-1980's, this was expanded further into Heritage Month with a calendar full of events through May that celebrates Bermudian culture, heritage, and traditions.

Bermuda Day has become the culminating point of Heritage Month and one of the most beloved cultural holidays alongside Cup Match (Emancipation Day & Mary Prince Day). On Bermuda Day, Bermudians showcase their pride in the beauty and diverse culture of our island – whether they participate in the parade, the half-marathon, go for their first swim of the year, attend the season's first fitted dinghy boat races, or follow the Gombeys through the streets crying, "Ay-oh!".

The **2025 Bermuda Day Parade** will begin at <u>1:30 PM</u>. The parade will begin on Front Street in front of Point House/Albuoy's Point area and continue along Front Street. The parade then turns left onto Court Street, takes a left onto Church Street, a right along Cedar Avenue, and ends at Marsh Folly Road/Dutton Avenue junction.

As of 2023, Coral serves on the Board of Directors for the Bermuda Monetary Authority, embodying her continued influence in the island's financial regulatory framework. Additionally, she holds the position of Director for HOME Charity since 2022, showcasing her commitment to philanthropy alongside her tech endeavors.

Since its founding in 2015, Connectech Coding under Coral's visionary leadership has stood out as Bermuda's leading technology training center. The institution is devoted to fostering collaboration, education, and innovation, thereby preparing Bermudian youth for the digital future and imminent career opportunities. Eugene O'Connor

Bermuda's Esteemed Kite Master and Cultural Guardian

Eugene O'Connor Sr., affectionately known as the Bermuda Kite Master, has significantly contributed to the island's cultural heritage through traditional kite making for over eight decades. Born with a knack for creativity and innovation, Eugene Sr. began his craft at the tender age of 7, passionately turning it into a legacy

synonymous with his name.

With a meticulous hand and an undying love for his craft, Eugene Sr. has created over a thousand kites

every Easter season, becoming a cherished figure within the community and beyond. His dedication to preserving this integral part of Bermudian culture has earned him the esteemed Awareness Award from the Bermuda National Trust. Eugene's commitment goes beyond

craftsmanship; he is a mentor and educator, eager to pass on his knowledge and skills to younger generations. His book, The Art of Kite Making, released in 2018, aimed to immortalize the craft, featuring detailed instructions and a collection of photographs that encapsulate his journey and the beauty of traditional Bermudian kites.

Eugene Sr.'s journey into the world of kite making began with humble materials and a curious mind, crafting kites from fennel sticks and pond weed, and later, wood from crates and crepe paper wrappers from the fruit shipping boxes that graced our shores, his creativity bound by no limits. His skill and artistry soon caught the attention of the community, turning his hobby into a sought-after commodity.

Over the years, Eugene Sr. has evolved his process, from hand-making kites for local stores to sharing his craft locally by conducting several workshops at hotels, art galleries and visiting many schools across the Island to international platforms, showcasing the vibrancy of Bermudian culture to the world. Despite choosing a career outside of kite making — working in Bermuda's once-thriving movie theaters as a chief projectionist for The Island Theatre, The Rosebank Theatre and later in sanitation for the Department of Works and Engineering — Eugene Sr. held fast to his passion for his craft.

Now, at 90, Eugene O'Connor Sr. continues to create, inspire, educate and maintain the tradition of Bermuda Kite making. Ensuring the kite, a symbol of freedom, creativity, and community, remains a beloved fixture in Bermudian skies. His life work and passion not only celebrates the art of kite making but also embodies the spirit of innovation, tradition, and cultural preservation.



Glenn Jones A Distinguished Career in Communication and Influence:

Glenn Jones is a seasoned professional with a multifaceted background encompassing 25 years in media, public communications, and tourism marketing across the United States and his beloved homeland, Bermuda. As a trusted evening anchor at NBC Boston since November 2021, Glenn has manifested

a commitment to excellence within one of America's most competitive media markets -Boston, Massachusetts—garnering a prestigious New England Region Emmy Award for his insightful reporting. His exceptional storytelling and journalistic skills also led to recognition and accolades during his tenures in both the Springfield, Massachusetts, and Fort Myers, Florida media markets.

Prior to his return to television, Glenn's career spanned an influential 15-year interval in Bermuda's public sector, including tourism. His strategic acumen came to the fore as press secretary to Bermuda's Premier, where he orchestrated local and international communications with a masterful touch. He played a pivotal role at the Bermuda Tourism Authority (BTA) for five years, culminating in a 15-month period as its interim CEO. During a transformative time at the BTA, Glenn was instrumental in formulating Bermuda's multiyear national tourism plan, a blueprint that ambitiously reoriented the island's aspirations within the hospitality sector.

Glenn's leadership extended to Bermuda's hosting of the America's Cup in 2017—a month-long sailing spectacle broadcast globally - as well as to the execution of a landmark spectator-attended PGA Tour

event amidst the pandemic—a testament to exceptional planning and resilience.

His tenure as general manager at MediaHouse further exemplified his flair for navigating diverse media channels, reinforcing his stature as a communications powerhouse.

In Boston, Glenn's humanitarian spirit shines. As a tireless volunteer, he has worked with Action for Boston Community Development to help uplift families out of poverty, and supported initiatives aimed at youth literacy, advancement for Black males, and opioid crisis interventions. His contributions to the community were recognized when he was named to GetKonnected's List of Most Influential Men of Color in Boston in 2023. Glenn's esteemed career has set him apart, locally and abroad, as a professional of immense accomplishments who balances personal ambition with strengthening communities and the social advancement of others.

An alumnus of Emerson College, Glenn resides in Boston with his wife Camille, where their love for Bermuda is authentic and infectious.



McKenzie-Kohl Tuckett

Championing Change and Empowering the Next Generation

McKenzie-Kohl Tuckett, 21, is a dynamic leader, advocate, and soon-to-be Bachelor of Laws graduate from the University of Bristol.

A former Head Girl at Warwick Academy, McKenzie-Kohl is a skilled public speaker and debater, who has represented Bermuda on the international stage since her

first overseas competition in 2017. Notably, in 2021, she placed 15th overall in the World Individual Debate and Public Speaking Championships. That same year, she won the University of Bristol Law Society's First Year Debate Championships.

While her competitive public speaking career is one to be proud of, she etched her name into Bermuda's history books as the first Bermudian to deliver an address in the UK House of Commons, in November 2022. Nominated by Bermuda's Speaker of the House, McKenzie-Kohl's speech highlighted the importance of creating opportunities for the island's young people, especially post-tertiary education.

As a former Youth Premier of Bermuda's Youth Parliament, and a current member of the National Youth Policy Working Group, this was an example of McKenzie-Kohl's advocacy for Bermuda's young people on the global stage. McKenzie-Kohl is also an Assistant Director of Future Leaders Bermuda, an organisation dedicated to equipping young leaders with the skills necessary to make a positive impact in Bermuda and the world.

McKenzie-Kohl believes in using one's voice to empower. As a member of the WeSpeak Teen Committee, she contributes to this vision, encouraging young women to use their voices to inspire confidence.

As a Bermuda Government Scholarship recipient and Walkers Legal Scholarship Award recipient, McKenzie-Kohl's academic success is matched by real-world experience. Studying at the University of Bristol, ranked in the top 10 in the UK, she has taken advantage of countless opportunities. In addition to serving as a Student Advisor in the university's Law Clinic, in 2023, she was the recipient of the International Internship Scholar Award for her summer legal internship at leading law firm Global Vietnam Lawyers, in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam. She was also selected to study abroad for her penultimate year at the University of Hong Kong, ranked #2 in Asia. Upon receiving the highest graded research paper in the LLM course, 'Equality and Non-Discrimination,' McKenzie-Kohl was invited to participate in a mini

pupillage at Pantheon Chambers in Hong Kong.

McKenzie-Kohl Tuckett isn't just preparing for the future, she's shaping it. She eagerly anticipates returning to the island, where she will begin her legal career with Walkers (Bermuda) Limited. As concluded in her speech in the House of Commons, she aims to support the creation of an opportunity-rich island, "to ensure that Bermuda's youth can call home, home."

Troika, currently under the direction of Seldon and Shoa Wolfe, has produced successful productions like 'Once On This Island,' 'Beauty and the Beast,' 'The Color Purple,' and 'Sarafina!'. His work has gone beyond entertainment, acting as a vehicle for education, inspiration, and connecting deeply with Bermudian culture.

In addition to his contributions to the arts, Seldon is currently employed as a Principal in AML/ATF Risk Analytics & Policy at the Bermuda Monetary Authority, applying his financial and compliance expertise to safeguard Bermuda's financial sector's stability and integrity. His dual roles highlight a unique combination of creativity and analytical skills, showcasing his holistic approach to contributing to Bermuda's growth in various sectors.

As the Director of NOVA Mas, a prominent Bermuda Carnival band, Seldon also excels in blending cultural festivities with strategic financial planning. His efforts support the entertainment industry and celebrate Bermuda's heritage, aiming to create inclusive experiences for audiences both in Bermuda and beyond.
